Let $f(x)$ and $g(x)$ be smooth real functions on an interval (a, b) with $g'(x) \neq 0$. It is a simple exercise to show that the tangent lines to the curves in the family $f(x) + kg(x)$ (k is a real number) at $x = t$ are concurrent and that the point of intersection lies on the curve $x = x - \frac{g(t)}{g'(t)}$, $y = f(t) - \frac{f'(t)g(t)}{g'(t)}$, where t varies in (a, b) . Some well known curves are produced by this construction. For instance, $g(x) = x - \frac{1}{x}$, ($0 < x < 1$), and $f(x) = -\ln(x)$ generate the tractrix, while $g(x) = \tan(\frac{x}{2})$ ($0 < x < \pi$) and $f(x) = -x \tan(\frac{x}{2})$ generate the cycloid.
