Oxley, Semple and Whittle described a tree decomposition for a 3-connected matroid M that displays, up to a natural equivalence, all non-trivial 3-separations of M . Crossing 3-separations gave rise to fundamental structures known as flowers. In this talk, we show that crossing separations of higher order also have a flower-like structure and we illustrate the kinds of structures that can arise by considering certain subsets of a vector space.
