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When the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) included reasoning and proof in K-12 mathematics standards (NCTM, 2000), elementary teachers were placed in a key role in mathematics reform. However, many elementary teachers have little training or experience with aspects of mathematical reasoning that must become the norm in classroom instruction (Blanton & Kaput, 2005). Using a combination of written and video-recorded qualitative data with performance based quantitative data analysis, the effect of a 10-day intensive summer institute focusing on developing algebraic reasoning and concept skills in 12 in-service K-8 teachers was analyzed. Results indicate that the in-service teachers perceptions about algebraic reasoning showed evidence of growth to a more complete and thorough understanding. This new understanding was further expressed by a statistically significant increase in the teachers ability to construct coherent and correct algebraic proofs from both familiar and unfamiliar conjectures ($p=0.012$). Documented reflections of teachers during and after participation in the program suggests that the participating in-service teachers planned to integrate both the pedagogical aspects of the course into their teaching placements as well as ideas of algebraic proof.
